Phonics, Literacy & Numeracy	Reminders and Next Week's Learning
Home Learning Sheets will be provided weekly to share the learning which has taken place during that week at school and looks ahead to the following week. your child can sequence pictures from one of their favourite stories.	Please ensure your child has a coat in school at all times as the weather is beginning to turn cold.
During maths we have been naming some shapes and their properties. We have focused on a circle, square, triangle and rectangle/oblong. Go for a shape hunt at home, which shapes can you find?	Unfortunately some items of clothing are going missing. <u>ALL</u> clothing must be named including coats and shoes. Hand written labels will only last for a short period of time; printed or embroidered name labels are much clearer and will last longer.
A large proportion of children are finding it difficult to write their name and recognise numbers 0-10. Please practise these key skills with your child.	All children must have a book bag in school to help take home letters, work and their belongings. We will also begin sending home reading books next
