Children will have experienced a broader curriculum and know that opportunities are available that develop, value and recognise individual skills and talent. Children will continue to develop a love of learning.	During the periods that the school was open, a number of after school clubs were run successfully. All PP children had the cost of these covered in part, or full. The full allocation was used for this purpose.

Educational trips will enhance the social, personal and emotional development of the children and will develop social skills and improve independence and self- confidence	Educational Trips were not possible during the Lockdowns. This meant that the money in this line had to be redirected for other purposes. A % was used to top up food parcels that went out to vulnerable families, to ensure that they were fit for purpose. A % was spent on learning resources for vulnerable children to use at home – pens, pencils, books etc.
